This summer I asked ministry leaders to go through the Refine process. During this process, we look at how God has been using our ministries to accomplish our Mission, Core Values, and Vision. To celebrate what has worked and to adjust what we can do better. As we have gone through the process, one of the words that kept coming up for me is clarity. We need to make sure we are clear in everything we do and everything we offer.

One area where people seemed to be particularly unclear is the difference between our Equip Class, D Groups and J Groups. This is of vital importance because each these reflect opportunities to learn and grow in community, but they are all a bit different. Let me explain.

According to the online Merriam-Webster's dictionary, the word equip means to furnish for service or action by appropriate provisioning. As all of the classes are announced I would encourage you to prayerfully consider which topic best touches what you need for this leg of the journey. These new classes will begin on Sep. 10.

Not only do we need to continuously be equipped, but we also need to intentionally join in the process of being and making Disciples. Our D(isciple) and J(ourney) groups seek to help you do that. The process of discipleship happens when we chose to walk with Jesus everyday, empowered by the Spirit, within the context of Christian Community, living on mission. Our D and J groups are both paths of Discipleship. They just do it differently. In both types of groups, we share life, study Scripture, and Pray and both groups are led by facilitators.

At this point you may be wondering what are the differences? They differ in a few ways:

- In D groups, men and women meet at the same time.
- In J groups, women and men meet separately.
- Ideally, D Groups meet for about an hour every week. Although, this can be flexible. J Group meetings tend to be longer, but they only meet every other week.
- D groups are larger, we like to have between 6-14 people. J Groups are smaller ideally, they have 3-5 members.
- D groups do a group Bible study, our current group takes a deeper dive into the sermon text for the week. J Group members
 are given tools to study Scripture at home, develop a quiet time, and share what the Lord has been teaching them.
- D groups tend to be open to allow people to join at points throughout the year. J groups are closed, and we ask for a ten month commitment.

I hope I have brought some clarity to the differences between Equip, D groups, and J Groups. If you would like to join a D group, they currently meet Wednesday morning at 10:00 at the church. If you would like to be part of a D group, but are unable to make it on Wednesdays let me know, and we will work with Dick and Jan Sipe to get a group set up. If you are interested in starting a new J group let me know and we will work with George Boutwell to get a new one going. If you have any questions, please do not he sitate to ask.
