Emerson Webster of FBC won a beautiful door prize of a tea set in basket.

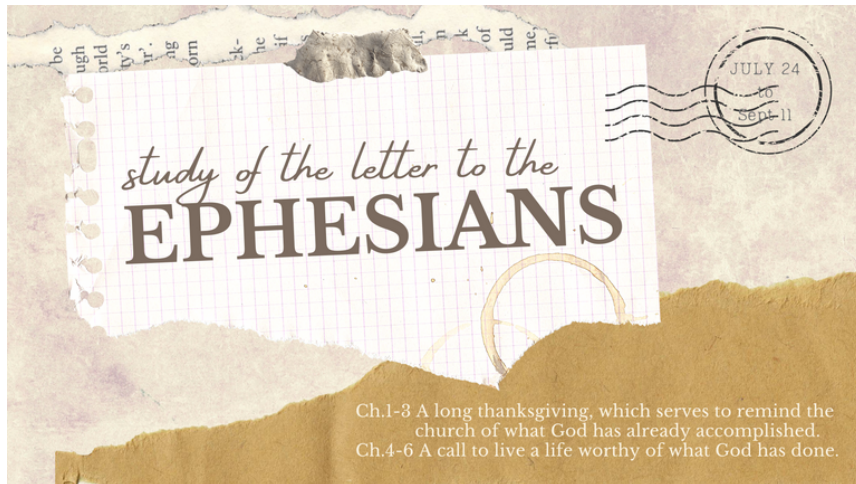


Local Women Attend National American Baptist Conference
